Making Surgery Safer by Decreasing Surgical Site Infection Risk.

Fatima Kamara at 18 years of age was the youngest member of the JH-GAPP team to Sierra Leone, but you would never know given the maturity of her performance during project preparation and project execution while in Sierra Leone. Of Sierra Leone heritage, this project had special meaning to Fatima.

Fatima is looking forward to entering medical school upon graduation. We look forward to seeing what Fatima will bring to global surgical care in general and surgical care Sierra Leone in particular.

Christaphine Bob-Ray is a JH-Biotechnology student who is graduating with her masters degree this month. Her job prospects are promising in the biotech field, but she will most likely be pursuing a medical degree at an institution that will allow her the freedom of integrating her biotechnology ideas into clinically practical applications.

Christaphine and Fatima were paired together during the 2018 JH-GAPP project to Sierra Leone where they worked on a Human Factors evaluation of the risks of surgical equipment sterilization that are inherent to the use of existing autoclaves in Sierra Leone. They compared these risks to potential identified risks associated with a newly invented device (Eniware EPS) that is capable of sterilizing surgical equipment without electricity and without an autoclave. This trip represented the first study of this device in Africa.



Past years of dictatorship, civil war and the recent Ebola crisis have left the Liberia health sector with very little manpower.

Existing surgeons, including a neurosurgeon and recently established surgical, obstetric/gynecology and pediatric residencies are training clinicians who operate with limited anesthesia support and no intensive care unit.

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Liberia - Safe Surgical Care Crisis! The Solution.

Anesthesia is an indispensable part of safe surgery and therefore, the development of this unique anesthesia training program has the potential to substantially strengthen Liberia's health sector by providing safe surgical care nation-wide, thus giving Liberia's citizens a much better chance of surviving cancer, trauma, birth and a myriad of other surgical conditions with reduced morbidity.

Objectives

- 1. Establishment of a sustainable Liberian based anesthesia residency that meets the requirements for certification by the West African College of Surgeons (WACS).
- 2. Introduction of enhanced operative and labor/delivery maternal care to improve care to the mother's of Liberia.
- Development of a unique simulation based continuing medical education program. Anesthesia trainees learn simulation techniques that target survivability and safe surgery as part of the curriculum and use these techniques to improve nurse anesthesia care nation-wide.
- 4. First sustainable intensive care unit in Liberia. Substantial enhancement of the WACS critical care curriculum with a focus on critical care in a cost constrained environment.

 Management of critically injured and ill patients in both urban and rural environments will be part of the curriculum with specific rotation with Liberia's first neurosurgeon.
- Leverage of online public health resources from "Partner" institutions to develop clinical research and public health skills amongst all accepted residents. Graduating residents should be part of the leadership for development of stronger health care system.
- 6. Visiting faculty for the residency program will systematically engage with the current nurse anesthesia training program at Phebe to increase the quality and annual capacity of nurse anesthetists produced.
- Incorporation of non-opioid pain relief techniques (regional nerve block and others) within the curriculum in full recognition of the long-term harm these medications can have on society.
